



CAMERA SURVEY 1969.

Land of the Great White Myth, I think photography must be rated the most popular (perhaps the only competitor is boozing). The results of the present survey bear me out, as once again this year every person on base owns a camera of one type or another, ranging from Norris's Hasselblad to Cas's instamatic 104. (perhaps there is one exception to this as Bobs Yashica J is no longer with us, haveing, drop to bits in his hand, so the saying goes).

In the following lists, I have not attempted to give every last filter and lenshood, but I have given a complete list of cameras and eccesory lenses as well as detailing other accesory items of interest. I have also included cine cameras in this years lilist, though interest and activity in cine is small compared to still photoraphy(at least as far as can be judged by ownership of equipment).

Its interesting to compaer the distribution of formats and brands, with those of former years. In the past at Halley Bay cameras tended towards 6x6cm. format and German makes (mainly Rollies). Now there isnt a single TLR on base, in fact the only 6x6 is Norris's Hasablad, while the 35mm. cameras are predominatly Japanese. As the big format disappears, the half (or single, if you prefer it) frame format is growing in strength, there being 6 on base. Is this a pointer to the future.

Within the 35mm range, Minolta has taken over as the undisputed most popular range, with Yashica running seconed, while Pentax (last years most popular make by a long way) has faded right out. However, this, think reflects more the fluctuating availability of a particular make in stanly rather than a trend in preferances.







THE INSIGNIFICANCE OF MAN

About 4,500,000,000 years ago the crust of the earth was formed. The exact time is not known as it was rather a long time ago and even present methods of dating do not run to such fine limits of accuracy at such extreme range. The figure quoted above, impressive as it is, really conveys very little to you or me. To visualize this vast expense of time it is much easier to compare it to a calendar year, which is a suitably tangible period of time. So to demonstrate the subject of this article let us say that the continents first began to form on or about the ist. of January.

During Jamuary, and indeed for most months in this year, the continents would bear absolutely no resemblance to the continents we know today. They were completely devoid of life of any form and remained so for many months. But right at the end of March, or the very beginning of April the first life did begin to evolve. The most primitive forms of algae and bacteria appeared in the seas of that time. We know very little of them because they are so rarely found and even when they are it is only traces of their existence which come to light, not the organisms themselves.

The bacteria and algae probably had things all their own way in the spring of this year and it would not have been until late summer that intruders began to appear on the scene. Very primitive invertebrates such as worms and sponges were the next animals to come along and these were to pave the way for the 'Creation' which was to occur in November.

During the 12th. of November, or possibly a day or so later, the 'Creation' occurred. Life seems to have suddenly appeared in abundance at this time but the reason for this is not certain. It seems most likely that the animal population of the seas had been growing for some time, almost certainly throughout October, but that the creatures suddenly developed the power to manufacture skeletons for themselves. Skeletons are fairly easily preserved in rocks and this would seem to be the reason for the sudden proliferation of dead bodies. During the last century this occurrence, the beginning of the Cambrian period, was look-

sd upon as the 'Creation' in all seriousness, and not as having taken place 600,000,000 years ago but in the year 4,004 B.C. on, I believe, the 4th. April. You may laugh, but they sincerely believed that in those days.

With the start of the Cambrian and the development of skeletons evolution had received a first class boost and things began to move pretty rapidly. The Cambrian seas were populated by various species of skell fish, sea lilies and sea scorpions. Nost of these creatures are still found in today's seas in rather changed forms except for the sea scorpions which only lasted until the 5th. December. About 22nd. November the first fishes appeared, hardly comparable with the fishes of today, but nevertheless fish. They fed on all the lower forms of life on the sea bed and by the 27th. of the month were grabbing through the first coral reefs for their lunch. At about the same time the colonisation of the land began, and the first spore-bearing plants found a foothold in the barren soils.

This was a great step forward and by the end of the month trees were growing in forests ready to form the great coal seams on December 7th. The advent of extensive vegetation on land allowed other forms of life to leave the seas and the first amphibians took tentative steps away from the shores. Spiders also appeared and with them, in the coal forests, the first winged insects. By this time the amphibians were pretty sure of their survival on land and the first reptiles evolved, small ones to start with but soon moving to the gigantic dinosaurs of the Jurassic by the 19th. December. The first flying reptile, Archaeopterix, appeared on the scene at this time and became the fore-runner of the birds we know today (only the feathered ones, for Homo Sapiens is still a long way off).

In the seas the fishes had been holding their own and expanding their size and variety along with all the other sea creatures except the Assonite. The Assonite was a beautiful, spirally coiled shell fish, not unlike the Nautilus of today, but with sore coils. He had a fairly long life from the end of November to his hey-day during the Jurassic in the middle of December but unfortunately over-coiled hisself in a special Yuletide effort and was extinguished on Christmas Day.

It was a white Christmas under the seas in this year since the diminutive foraminifera living just below the surface were dying off in their countless billions and sinking to the bottom to form the chalk downs that you can see in Southern England today.

On the land at this time flowering plants blossomed forth so the dinosaurs took a last look before dying out in

the mud swamps. The dinosaurs' disappearance gave the newly evolved mammals a chance to gain a foothold and on Boxing Day the ancestral horses, cattle and elephants took their first look around. They were only very small, not much larger than dogs, but with time they grew to their present sizes. The elephants actually went a good deal further and could have been found almost everywhere by early morning on New Year's Eve, but they have since suffered a decline and are pretty restricted.

But two days before the elephants were getting around the first of the ancestral pigs and apes appeared. So on the 363rd. day of the year the first of Man's reacte ancestors appeared. He too was pretty small and insignificant and would hardly be recognised as a sonkey by today's standards. However, by New Year's Eve all the mammals, as well as the elephants, were breeding rapidly and very diversely so that by about seven o'clock in the evening a creature showing a vague resemblance to Stone Age Man could have been seen leaping out of his cave to lob rocks at passing elephants.

Men had appeared. He had a struggle for survival, not in fact fighting great toothy dinosaurs and flying reptiles as depicted in 'A Million Years B.C.' but chasing pigs and deer. He did not have such an attractive mate as Raquel Welch either which perhaps also hindered the propagation of his species but he did survive and better himself until at about a quarter to midnight he found the temperature dropping with an Ice Age on the way. However, he managed to survive this and by about a minute to midnight he had emerged as a true Homo Sapenid.

And now we are at the stroke of midnight just about to enter a New Year although we ourselves will survive barely half a second of it. But what of the future of our species ? How long will they survive ?

Rapidly evolving groups seldom survive very long, and Man has evolved fairly rapidly, but on the other hand he is not highly specialised and can adapt himself to a variety of different environments. 




